Comments from the Portfolio Managers

Please note that the commentary below includes historic information on the Company's NAV performance data, index and share price performance, and also the portfolio's options exposure and the delta of the options.

The figures shown relate to past performance. Past performance is not a reliable indicator of current or future results.

For the one-month period ended 31 March 2021, the Company's NAV increased by 7.8% and the share price by 12.9% (all in sterling). The Company's benchmark, the Russell 1000 Value Index, returned 7.3%¹ for the period.

The largest contributor to relative performance was stock selection in the health care sector. Notably, stock selection and an overweight exposure to health care providers and services proved beneficial, as did selection decisions in the pharmaceuticals industry. In communication services, the decision to not invest in the entertainment and interactive media and services industries boosted relative returns, as did stock selection among media companies. Other contributors during the period included stock selection in the financials and consumer staples sectors.

The largest detractor from relative performance was stock selection and allocation decisions in the industrials sector. Notably, stock selection in the aerospace and defence and industrial conglomerates industries weighed on relative returns, as did the decision to not invest in machinery and building products companies. In materials, an underweight exposure to the chemicals and metals and mining industries also proved costly. At the industry level, other detractors during the month included stock selection in specialty retail and food products.

The portfolio's option overwriting strategy detracted from relative performance during the month, as did the portfolio's cash position, amid rising U.S. stock prices.

Transactions/Options

Transactions: In March, the portfolio added to existing positions in Lear, The Williams and Kinder Morgan. Conversely, we exited our position in ONEOK and reduced our exposure to DuPont De Nemours, Marathon Petroleum Corporation and American Express.

Options: As of 31 March 2021, the Company's options exposure was 18.3% and the delta of the options was 85.1.

Positioning

As of the period end, the Company's largest overweight positions relative to the benchmark were in the financials, health care and energy sectors. The Company's largest underweight positions relative to the benchmark were in the industrials, real estate and materials sectors.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

DELTA

Delta is one of four major risk measures used by option traders and investors. Delta measures the sensitivity of the option price to changes in the price of the underlying asset (i.e. stock). For example, if a stock option has a delta value of 0.80, this means that if the underlying stock increases in price by \$1 per share, the option on it will rise in value by \$0.80, all else being equal.

The BlackRock North American Income Trust plc portfolio invests in stocks and also utilises an option overwriting strategy (i.e. writing and selling covered call options) to enhance the portfolio's income. Therefore, the delta of the portfolio (stocks and options securities combined) measures the portfolio's price sensitivity to changes in the price of the portfolio's underlying equity securities, all else being equal.

DISCOUNT/PREMIUM

Investment trust shares frequently trade at a discount or premium to the NAV. This occurs when the share price is less than (a discount) or more than (a premium) to the NAV. The discount or premium is the difference between the share price (based on mid-market share prices) and the NAV, expressed as a percentage of the NAV.

Discounts and premiums are mainly the consequence of supply and demand for the shares on the stock market.

GEARING

Investment companies can borrow to purchase additional investments. This is called 'gearing'. It allows investment companies to take advantage of a long-term view on a sector or to take advantage of a favourable situation or a particularly attractive stock without having to sell existing investments.

Gearing works by magnifying the company's performance. If a company 'gears up' and then markets rise and the returns on the investments outstrip the costs of borrowing, the overall returns to investors will be even greater. But if markets fall and the performance of the assets in the portfolio is poor, then losses suffered by the investor will also be magnified.

NET YIELD

The net yield is calculated using total dividends declared in the last 12 months (as at date of this factsheet) as a percentage of the month end share price.

NAV (Net Asset Value)

A company's undiluted NAV is its available shareholders' funds divided by the number of shares in issue (excluding treasury shares), before making any adjustment for any

potentially dilutive securities which the Company may have in issue, such as subscription shares, convertible bonds or treasury shares. A diluted NAV is calculated on the assumption that holders of any convertibles have converted, subscription shares have been exercised and treasury shares are re-issued at the mid-market price, to the extent that the NAV per share is higher than the price of each of these shares or securities and that they are 'in the money'. The aim is to ensure that shareholders have a full understanding of the potential impact on the Company's NAV if these instruments had been exercised on a particular date.

ONGOING CHARGES RATIO

Ongoing charges (%) =

Ongoing charges are those expenses of a type which are likely to recur in the foreseeable future, whether charged to capital or revenue, and which relate to the operation of the investment company as a collective fund, excluding the costs of acquisition/disposal of investments, financing charges and gains/losses arising on investments. Ongoing charges are based on costs incurred in the year as being the best estimate of future costs and include the annual management fee.

OPTIONS AND OPTIONS OVERWRITING STRATEGY

An option is a contract that offers the buyer the right, but not the obligation, to buy (call) or sell (put) a security or other financial asset at an agreed-upon price (the strike price) during a certain period of time or on a specific date (exercise date) for a fee (the premium). The sale of call or put options on stocks that are believed to be overpriced or under-priced, based on the assumption that the options will not be exercised, is referred to as an 'options overwriting' strategy. The seller of the option collects a premium but, if the option subsequently expires without being exercised, there will be no downside for the seller. However, if the stock rises above the exercise price the holder of the option is likely to exercise the option and this strategy can reduce returns in a rising market.

The Company employs an options overwriting strategy but seeks to mitigate risk by utilising predominantly covered call options (meaning that call options are only written in respect of stocks already owned within the Company's portfolio such that, if the options are exercised, the Company does not need to purchase stock externally at fluctuating market prices to meet its obligations under the options contract). Any use of derivatives for efficient portfolio management and options for investment purposes will be made on the basis of the same principles of risk spreading and diversification that apply to the Company's direct investments.
